



Just what is the LSCWA and what do they do?

In 1976 a group of concerned anglers got together to combat the problem of the commercial fishing on Lake St. Clair. After more pressure from other MUCC groups, local politicians and help from our Canadian neighbors on their side of the lake, commercial fishing ended. We have since shifted our focus on protecting, preserving and promoting one of the greatest fishing spots in the world, Lake St. Clair.

What do we do?...

We have raised nearly 4 million walleye fry for planting in local lakes for the Michigan Department of Natural Resources on our rearing ponds at Selfridge ANG base.

Every year we send kids to MUCC's Summer Camp at Cedar Lake, in 2016 we sent 8, last year we sent 12! This year we are looking forward to again offer the great outdoor experience of summer to camp to our member's kids.

Free seminars at our monthly meetings. Local, master fisherman give free seminars customized for fishing the local rivers and lakes, helping you to catch more fish during your time on the water.

Along with teaching you fishing, we also are looking out for our future generations by offering \$1000 in scholarship money each year to first year college students of club members.

Service to the community, in 2016 we took the lead in getting the fish cleaning station in St. Clair back in operation through a fish fry to raise funds and also making a donation to get it repaired and functioning.

Derbies and tournaments, we have a club derby season that currently runs from April to August. It is open to all members in good standing with youth, open and master divisions. The derbies are usually held at our sponsoring bait shops with food and refreshments served during the weigh ins. Our tournaments are growing, we had May Madness 3 this past year with 42 boats entered vying for a top prize of \$5,000--- not a bad payoff for a good day of fishing! The perch and pig in the fall is another tournament that is also growing. In October we have 19 boat's entered for a top prize of nearly \$1,000 for the heaviest catch of 25 yellow perch!

We also hold free kids summer and winter ice fishing outings (safe ice permitting) with bait, poles and food and refreshments provided to all. Furthermore, we donate to local charities and food banks, as we have always felt the need to help out our community on and off the water.

There's plenty of other activities and events we participate in on both large and small scale, including professional fishing events!

Why not check us out sometime?

December Lake Erie Trolling

As 2017 came to a close I knew my open water fishing opportunities would be dwindling. So on December 2nd I decided I needed to get out and troll Lake Erie's Michigan waters. At the time I had not fished on Lake Erie Michigan Waters in over 15 years. This would be my first time being out on Lake Erie running my own boat. I gave my buddy Dan Stewart a call to join me and he was fired up to get after the walleyes. We launched out of sterling state park and began our troll in Brest Bay south of stony point after marking suspended fish. Water surface temperatures were a frigid 40 degrees. We pulled Smithwick Perfect 10s, Bandit Deep Walleyes, and Rapala DDHJ12s at a slow crawl of 1.3 MPH SOG. I used my electric Motorguide trolling motor to stealthfully glide during each of my trolling passes. Nothing was happening where we started so we picked up and motored 4 miles Northeast of the bay in search of pods of fish and warmer water. We were able to find a patch of 43-degree water and fish scattered throughout the water column. Time to set lines. Not shortly after we had our first board rip back and we were hooked up on walleyes. A Smithwick Perfect 10 in cheap sunglasses pulled 65 feet behind the planer board took our first fish. The next fish would fall to a Blue/Chrome/Orange Perfect 10. We continued working this pod of fish by spreading baits throughout the water column. Bandits 55 feet back started taking fish with colors IB Frozen and Black/Gold/Orange doing the most damage. We also ran one of John Latham's custom Pink Vampire DDHJ12s with a 2oz snap weight to pull in some of the larger fish hugging closer to the bottom. To end the day, we closed the deal on a triple header of walleyes to boat our 2-man limit. What a great way to become reacquainted with Michigan's slice of Lake Erie. After 15 years of not fishing this area, I could not have enjoyed this much success on Lake Erie without absorbing all the knowledge I could from fellow anglers in the LSCWA. It pays to be a member.



Across the Pond

Starting in 2018 Walleye World will be bringing back a new spin on an old idea of tapping into our friends on the Canadian side of LSC with a segment called "Across the Pond" presented by Canadian coast guard member and successful owner/operator of Pond predator charters captain Nick Oberemok. Nick is a near daily fisherman offering spring jigging and handlining for Walleye, summer trolling for musky and Walleye and fall and winter perch and Walleye. The focus on this segment is to keep us guys on the American side up to date with the latest local regulation changes, important date reminders, Lake and access conditions, followed by the most recent Fishing reports to prepare you for next trip to the Canadian side weather it be during hard or soft water. Reminder that Canadian fishing license expire December 31st. Captain Nick reports as anglers are now starting to get out to some of their favorite spots out of St Luke's marina and and Mitchell's bay that ice and water clarity are ideal with 8-9 inches of good clear safe ice and with the cold temps showing a growth of an inch a day. 12 to even 14" perch with a few Walleye's are being taken and Kens spoons seem to be the hot ticket right now with these early ice active fish which are being found in anywhere from 4-15fow so don't be afraid to try in close and with good current ice conditions and even colder weather in the forecast many machines will be venturing out to some of their favorite spots. As always we stress caution and safety whenever you are on the ice so make sure to stop, check the ice along your path and always notify someone of where you are going and when to expect you back. Can't Stop Shivering



When Freshwater Fishing Hall of Fame anglers Keith Kavajecz and Gary Parsons finished 1st and 2n in the National Walleye Tour event out of Escanaba, MI back in August of 2014, the word from the water was they were using a new and innovative technique. Very shortly after that NWT event, they spilled the beans, revealing that the **Moonshine Shiver Minnow** as a crucial part of their winning presentation. During practice, Gary and Keith had developed, and mastered the technique now known as "Shivering", and it paid off in a big way. The "Shiver Minnow" itself is a glide style bait specially designed and built by a fine gentleman by the name of Tom Gudwer, owner of the **Moonshine Bait Company** primarily to be an ice fishing lure; but it has since taken the casting world by storm. If you haven't already gotten into doing it, casting and catching big Walleyes is absolutely some of the most fun you can have in fishing, and "Shivering" is by far the coolest way to do it! Here's how.

The Setup

You'll need to start with a good selection of #2 and #3 Shiver Minnows, the glow colors work fantastic in lower light or overcast conditions, while the metallics and holographics are awesome in clear water or bright conditions, so match the hatch, or choose colors that tend to produce on your chosen body of water. As a general rule, I use the **1oz #3 Shiver Minnow** when the water depth exceeds 15 feet. For shallower water, or when I'm looking for a slower presentation in deeper water, I'll drop down a size to the 1/2oz #2. Long casts and long range hooksets are pretty typical, especially in clear water, so it is also essential that you spool up your spinning reel with a low diameter high-visibility 10-15lb non stretch superline, such as Sunline SX1, TX1, to help cut the water and drive the hooks into those hungry Walleyes. To aid with abrasion resistance from Zebra Mussels and mainline visibility tie on 3 to 6 feet of 12-15 lb fluorocarbon leader to your mainline using an Albright knot or a tie small barrel swivel and then your leader. A small snap can make it quick to change baits, however I've found that tying direct to my Shiver Minnow with the stiffer fluorocarbon helps to keep the bait from rolling over on itself.

Shivering is not a finesse presentation, so you may very well be already equipped with the right equipment to successfully shiver up some big Walleyes. Any good quality 6' to 7'6" foot medium light to medium action spinning rod with a **fast to extra fast tip** will do the job just fine. Length of your setup is somewhat of a personal preference, however one important feature is having a enough backbone to drive the hooks home on #3 shiver minnow, as it's a heavy bait. I have tried a wide array of spinning rods, but my personal go to setup now is a a MS632XF Denali Myriad. Along with the extra fast tip and rock solid backbone, I have also really come to like the raised palm grip that helps limit the fatigue on your hands and arms after a day of casting a 1oz bait.




A nice inland lake Walleye on a Shiver minnow from over 40 feet of water!

Mark'em Catch'em

Focus your search for the best "Shivering" locations by targeting your classic fish holding structure areas such as points, humps, or good shoreline breaks adjacent to deep water. If you mark fish that you think might be Walleyes, don't be afraid to give a "Shiver" a try. Shiver fish will be orienting to the bottom, feeding on forage such as Gobies, Yellow Perch, or even Rusty Crayfish. You may find that some of these areas hold small schools or pods of fish, while others may hold only a few individual Walleyes. Electronics play an important role in "Shivering"! While you can certainly have success by simply "fishing" likely spots, if you believe in and use your electronics effectively, you'll drastically increase the amount of fish that come topside. I have found it

increasingly productive in my own fishing to graph and fish for individual fish. With the quality of today's electronics it's simple to scroll back and drop a waypoint precisely on an individual fish. It's then a matter of positioning the boat upwind or off to the side within casting distance, setting your spotlock or anchor mode and "Shiver" it up. Have confidence! Learning to use, read, and understand the down and sidescan options will certainly up your game. While crystal clear and calm conditions may bear some influence, typically in waters 20 ft or deeper I'm able to readily mark Walleyes with the downscan overlay on traditional sonar, while in shallower water the sidescan becomes very helpful for finding those fish to target out to the sides of the boat. I've Shivered up Walleyes in waters from 10ft all the way to 65 ft deep so don't be afraid to go into search mode.

Cadence is Key

There really are secrets, but the trick to getting "bit" while Shivering is to find the **cadence** that the fish want, I'm referring to the frequency at which you are quickly sweeping, or what I like to call "popping" your rod upward as you work the bait. Shiver minnows are truly unique glide baits in that they dart side to side, changing direction every time you snap your rod upward thus creating a "Walk the Dog" effect. This action drives Walleyes insane! I've found the most success starting by initially letting the bait fall to bottom on a tight line. Once the bait hits bottom, immediately give the rod a sweep of about a three feet; this hops the bait off bottom to either the left or right. Immediately drop the rod tip, giving the bait slack, which will help it change direction. Then, quickly reel up your slack from this motion as bait is gliding back down toward bottom repeating the sequence three, four, or even five times. The deeper the water is, typically the longer you'll wait between "popping" the bait. With each pop and drop of the rod your Shiver Minnow will erratically change directions. Ultimately the goal is to keep the bait "walking the dog" just off bottom, allowing the occasional longer pause bottom contact if you can do so without fouling up. You are basically trying to mimic a dying baitfish, be that a Goby, Perch, or Shiner and your Shiver Minnow is the perfect imposter. Don't be afraid to experiment with your cadence, sometimes it's just a subtle variation in the presentation that will trigger the predatory instincts of a big hungry Walleye!

The Bite

Created by your cadence, the visual aspect of your Shiver Minnow darting back and forth really captures a Walleyes attention, but almost all of your strikes will be triggered by the "fall" or "glide". That being said, bites can vary greatly, from a savage arm jarring hits, to a subtle tap, to almost nothing, with the latter two being the most common. Shivering causes Walleyes to instinctively rush in very and grab your bait, sometimes even swallowing them or catching it on the "glide"; if your line is slack you may feel nothing but dead weight on the next lift. Set the hook, hard! Also, many times while going through your cadence, you may feel a "swoosh" type of sensation of a Walleye taking a swipe at your bait. These Walleyes seem to be quite aggressive, and can often be made to strike again immediately by giving a little variation to your Cadence such as a quick short double pop or perhaps a longer pause indicating to that fish that they have wounded the bait fish they are after, resulting in a strike. If the bottom allows, try making contact every two or three sequences, strikes will very often occur simultaneously as the bait contacts bottom as a big Walleye will attempts to pin or "smash" the bait into the bottom.

Just Do It

We all get comfortable with our own preferred ways of fishing, for many, it's trolling, for others, it's vertical jigging. If you have a desire to become a better, more well rounded Walleye angler, you'll need to break out of your habits and try some new techniques. Why not start with "Shivering"? An easy way to start, is to simply leave everything at home but you casting rods, a box full of Shiver Minnows, and some determination. So, get yourself set up and give this cool technique a good honest try, I'm sure you won't be able to stop "Shivering" either.



Now Is The Time

Now is the time to start preparations for the spring "soft water" fishing season. If you can get started and ahead of the game now, come spring the hectic, chaotic last minute frenzy of getting everything ready will no longer be.

Most of the things can be done now, in the living room in front of the TV with a beverage in hand. Organizing tackle, replacing hooks, adding the new ones acquired over the winter to the herd. One can never have enough crankbaits right? Collecting up all the jigs and soft plastics and returning them to their proper home. I know for me my soft plastic bags look like a jailbreak. Same with jigs. Separating them now by color/size will only add to time spent fishing instead of sorting come April. Another thing that I do is when I get a new bag of soft plastics. I add some scent/attractant to the bag. This gives the bait a chance to have that smell sink into the plastic. This will hopefully keep that jig in the fish's mouth just long enough to set the hook. Make those crawlers harnesses. You will be happy you did in May once the bass invade the river and you are not up half the night tying them the night before your first lake trip of the season. Planer boards. Clips wear out. Screws get loosened.

Can't overlook maintenance on your rods and reels. Fresh line, broken guides, gear lube, recalibrate your line counters. So much to do. Any one of these being neglected could be enough to prevent a trip to the taxidermist at worst or a fish fry. Take the time now it is well worth it.

Take care of your boat and its accessories too. Batteries need to be stored properly. Electronics in a warm place. If you are planning any boat repairs or upgrades and have access to it...get it done. 2 seasons ago I neglected my batteries. First time out. Not 1 dead battery...3! Talk about a bummer. Took a day off work early April, first trip of the season. Got to the ramp.....nada. Strange thing though is the boat did start at home in the warm garage. I thought I was good. Lesson learned the hard way.

Remember all these things as you are walking around the ultimate fishing show and thinking to yourself as you are buying 20\$ worth of harness blades or a dozen custom crankbaits. Your success this summer starts now.

LSC Ice Fishing 101

Hey LSCWA, Local Lake St. Clair angler Trevor Larson here with some tips and tactics, ice safety advice and preparation for a high catch rate efficiency.

First and foremost ice safety is key. As canals and marinas typically are the first areas to freeze, a good 2-3 inches will get the Brave anglers out itching for those first ice buckets full of jumbo perch and slab panfish. Always carry a spud bar and ice picks in these new ice situations and never fish alone. The last thing we want is to not only fall through the ice, but call out the ice rescue team and the worst possibility, not make it home.

Preparation is also key. Whether it's charging batteries for your electronics of choice, getting your auger blades sharpened, stocking up on your favorite spoons, plastics or tungsten jigs, or re-spooling rods and tip-ups, it's always key to be ready when first ice calls. I prefer running and gunning "hole hopping" for finesse fishing panfish. 32-36" rods with 2-3 lbs. test line

Primarily being a panfisherman, I always start off in local canals and marinas and then branch off into the bay and main lake when I hear of a hot bite on perch, pike or walleyes. Such information can be found by local guys posting on Facebook fishing groups like Lake St. Clair Fishing (Ice, Shore & Boat) or Ice Junkies Outdoors. When looking for a particular canal or marina to fish, I opt for the deeper marinas that fish will enter and hold in like a fishbowl. I like to look for docks and seawalls with ladders and wooden posts. These minor details can be game changers from one angler to another fishing near each other. Ladders, sunken logs and brush and weed beds will hold fish trying to avoid predators like pike and bass because they feel secure and hidden in these spots. Wooden posts will hold food sources like bugs, mites and small baitfish that crappies and other panfish alike will feed on during winter months. Although I prefer small tungsten jigs tipped with live baits like spikes or wax worms, artificial baits definitely have their time and place for those finicky and high pressured fish. Sometimes the bigger fish, perch and crappies especially will "take the bait" on those plastics resulting in my favorite, a panfish dinner for the family.

In closing out, I'd like to wish all of you Lake St. Clair ice anglers a safe and successful season, Happy Holidays and a Happy New Year.




