

BOATING SAFETY MAY SAVE YOUR LIFE *by Keith Krych*

This January on Lake Okeechobee during a BFL Bass tournament, a 38 year old Army veteran was thrown from the boat he was a co-angler on and died. The pro-boater tried to deploy his bow trolling motor to rescue the co-angler, but he lost his balance and fell overboard too. He had to hold on to the trolling motors cord until the boat drifted to shore around 11pm that night. The co-angler wasn't found for four days and died of hypothermia.

The weather at time of takeoff was marginal, but winds were predicted to increase to 18-20 mph. Just to the East on the Ocean there were Small Craft Warnings in effect by the Coast Guard, but because Okeechobee is considered an inland lake there were no warning in effect on the lake. (Okeechobee covers 730 squares miles) The anglers took the inland waterway around part of the lake, then cut across the middle of the lake just as the winds increased. The boat speared a wave tossing the co-angler from the boat and disabling the main motor. Both anglers were wearing lifejackets as required by tournament rules.

OK those were the facts of the accident. This is where we can learn from their and the tournament official's mistakes.

First Lake Okeechobee is a HUGE lake and about as deep as Lake St Clair. So it can get mean in a hurry. The weather was marginal at the start but higher winds were coming in from the ocean just east and the USCG had a small craft advisory in effect just off shore where the winds were coming from.

Tournament officials almost always want to get a tournament in. They can't reschedule dates most of the times and they put the responsibility on the anglers a lot of the times. This is bad in many ways.

The boater in this case took the shortest route to his chosen fishing spot in deteriorating conditions. This was a bad decision on his part. He speared a wave so he also may have been running too fast for the conditions also.

When the co-angler was tossed from the boat, the boater tried to restart the big motor but it failed to start. He then went to front of the boat to deploy his trolling motor. This was a huge mistake. His First action should have been to mark the man overboard on his GPS. This would have save countless hours of looking for the man and could have saved his life by itself. He also should have checked his Kill Switch that was attached to his life jacket. If he speared a wave hard enough to toss his co-angler overboard, his Kill Switch was probably dislodged also.

Next he should of call for help on a VHF radio. The problem is Bass tournaments don't require a VHF radio!?! Make sure you have one, a wet cell phone is useless and cell towers do not cover all the lake.

His next action should have been to deploy an anchor. Again bass boats do not usually carry an anchor. On the Great Lake you should have an anchor rated for your boat with at least 6' of heavy chain and 150' of good line. As well as a See Anchor (drift sock).

If the boater would have had this basic safety equipment on board, the accident would have turned out quite differently for both of them.

Make sure you check your lifejackets for holes, mildew and fading at the start of every season. If you have an inflatable lifejacket, it's a very good idea to change the cartage and pellet also at the start of the year. Check your throwable also for mold, tears and make sure the line attached is at least 50' long.

Check your VHF radio and if it needs replacement get one of the newer ones with DSC distress calling feature.

Check your anchor line and get at least two sea anchors (drift socks) if you don't have them.

Double check your fire extinguishers, they recently had a recall on them. The powder inside fire extinguishers can get compacted in a boat, so it's a good idea to turn them upside down shake them at the start of the season. Some also have expiration dates stamped on the bottom of the canister, so double check that too.

Make sure you have a whistle or other sound producing device handy. A lot of anglers put one on their life vests. Also a Personal signal device is a good idea for a PFD, (whistle, flashing device, calamine stick).

Another thing to check every season is your Visual Distress Signals (VDSs). Check the expiration date on the flares, smoke devices, or meteors. Also make sure you have a distress flag, orange with black square and circle. Have a handheld night light with extra batteries on board too.

A float plan is always a good idea to do before going on the water. Let someone know where your launching, where you'll be fishing and how long you'll be gone.

Finally, but it should be first on the list. If you haven't taken a Safe Boating Course, TAKE ONE NOW!!!


I would like to thank all who helped at the Spring Classic and Bass Pro Shop for their support of the club over the years.

The guest speaker at our March meeting will be Ethan Wright. The seminar topic will be open water trolling for walleye. Come out and try and cure some of that spring fever and maybe learn a thing or two. It is almost that time.

Across the Pond with Captain Nick from Pond Predator Charters



Hey Guys Nick here from Pond Predator Charters. I wanna talk about our winter walleye season and what we can expect this spring. We were very fortunate to have a cold start to the winter resulting in good early ice and with that brought some phenomenal walleye fishing on the Thames River. With light currents and clean visibility early in the season we were able to dial in fish quickly that were averaging 20-24 inches with some big fish in the 28-31 inch class. Seemed like everyone's favorite spots were producing with the best bite being around 8am. I had great success on chartreuse Swedish pimpls, Orange Sonic Spoons by Extreme tackle, Kamookies and buckshot jigs. Baits tipped with live minnows were a must and it seemed the more minnows you could get on the hook the better. The deep holes in the lake were also producing fish, but unfortunately with the mild January thaw we had, it made for very unstable and unsafe ice conditions out in the middle of the lake. Walleye anglers were then targeting and catching fish in 4-6 feet of water off of places like Belle River and Stoney point but the bite was really hit or miss. With the ice out we are all going to have spring river walleye on our minds and I think for good reason. Last year there was a lot of 14-18 inch fish in the Erie/Detroit River/LSC system. I think we are gonna find a big growth in those numbers making 2018 one of our most productive years in a while. American side should see a lot more fish in the slot size and hopefully if the season is on schedule we will start to see fish being caught by the last week of March with good schooling numbers of fish by second week of April. Our biggest threat early season is unpredictable wind and dirty water. Last year our boat netted 1850 walleye in a 10 week period making it a record year for me. I would love to see that again this year and we have good reason to believe it will. Last year was also a record year for me on LSC seeing huge numbers of schooling fish on the south shore staying around till as late as the end of July and to be honest never stopped but by then we are switching gears into our Muskie program. We ran a lot of shad raps on our summer program with silver and black being the most productive in as shallow as 4fow and deep as 17fow so fish were spread and on the move. I hope everyone had a great safe winter and good luck this spring. If you see us on the water be sure to wave. Follow us on Facebook at Pond Predator Charters for up to date conditions, reports and news from the Canadian side of the river and lake. Tight lines!

Welcoming Spring Recipes

Properly packaged, wrapped and frozen fish can easily remain tasty for up to a year. If kept frozen at very low temperatures the fish can still be OK to eat for a couple of years but it will no longer taste good. Time to check the freezers for packages of fish left over from last fall or the start of the winter's ice season.

These two recipes are great for pot-lucks, dinner parties or those afternoons when the gang is over. I have tried each of them. The Perch Cocktail dip was an afternoon meal not all that long ago. The Perch Dip is a recipe from Capt Dan Chimirak, part owner of Lakeside Fishing Shop in St. Clair Shores. Lakeside has been a consistent friend of the LSCWA since the start. The shop has hosted one or more of the club's summer Walleye weigh-in derbies each year since the start. Dan himself has been known to whip up a quick taste treat for those who attended. This is one of his party snacks.

CAPT DAN'S FAMOUS PERCH COCKTAIL DIP

1 pound skinned Perch fillets

4 tablespoons Horseradish

2 tablespoons Minced Garlic

3/4 cup Cocktail Sauce

1 cup grated cheese (pick your favorite)

Boil the Perch fillets in salted water for 3 minutes. Drain and cool in ice water. Drain and crumble the fillets.

Mix all the ingredients and put in the fridge for 2 hours.

Capt Dan recommends serving with crackers. An optional choice is to use the slices of the Cocktail Bread available either as a Rye or a Pumpernickel bread. They can be found in the deli area of most larger supermarkets.

Note: Many might think that there is too much Horseradish but it works. The horseradish mellows out while the dip is resting in the refrigerator.

Richard Benson has been club president for several years now and before that served on the Board of Directors. Being an active fisherman has kept Rich's freezer stocked with Walleye fillets. On more than one occasion I have had the opportunity to try his Walleye Dip.

RICHARD BENSON'S WALLEYE DIP

Approx 1 to 1 1/4 pound of filleted Walleye, poached.

1 cup Sour Cream

1 cup Mayonnaise

1/2 cup plus Parmesan Cheese

Ground or finely minced Garlic (not Garlic Salt)

Old Bay seasoning

Optional additions:

Minced Artichokes


Cooked and shredded Spinach

Poach Walleye and break apart. Put the fish, mayo, sour cream, most of the Parmesan Cheese into a large mixing bowl, some of the granulated garlic and the optional artichokes or spinach. Stir and blend together without breaking the fish into tiny pieces. Add more garlic or Parmesan Cheese to taste. Spread mixture out in a loaf pan or casserole dish, preferably glass, and sprinkle some Old Bay seasoning over the top.

Place in 350 degree oven until the spread is warmed all the way through with just a slight crust on top.

Serve very warm or hot with pieces of a bread loaf, pita bread or crackers.


