### HURON'S FALL HAWGS

It's mid October and you could clean the gutters and get the yard ready for winter. Or you could head down to Huron Ohio and go after what could be a fish of a lifetime.

The port of Huron Ohio has turned into a Mecca for fall walleye anglers. Large schools of


eyes concentrate off the river mouth and out at the "sand bar". The sand bar is a large area of sand and gravel surrounded by mud flats in 30 to 35 fow. Walleyes are drawn to this area as they migrate back from the deep eastern basin of Lake Erie.

Look for the "fleet" and set up trolling with the wind. What you're hoping to see on your fish finder is suspended fish and bait off the bottom. Target your lures just above the depth the fish are at. Remember you need to cover the entire water column too. Never ignore the top 10 feet even if you're in 40 feet of water. Start your trolling speed at 2mph and you may have to crank it up to 2.5mph or slowdown to 1mph.

The basic daytime pattern is trolling deep diving crankbaits off in-line planers or spoons with dipsys. Reef Runners and Rapala Deep Husky Jerks are the preferred crankbaits in eriedescent, fried chicken, confusion, and clown. Popular spoon patterns are confusion, kevorkian and monkey puke in Stinger Scorpions, and mini Silver Streaks. Listen to the radio for the color of the day.

If the daytime bite gets boring, the night fishery is awesome. Try trolling Smithwick Rogues, shallow running Reef Runners, or Rapala Husky Jerks near the river mouth. Fish in the 10 pound class are common here. The Ohio state record was caught off these pier heads at night.



## DNR WEB SITE OFFERS NEW FEATURES

Visitors to the Department of Natural Resources Web site will see two new features on it. An image gallery has been added to the site, featuring the photographs of DNR Photographer David Kenyon. Also, an interactive map showing state parks with State Explorer programs for children will help families determine activities available at the parks they are visiting.

The DNR Web site is located on the state of Michigan governmental portal at [www.michigan.gov/dnr](http://www.michigan.gov/dnr).

The image gallery contains 12 images by Kenyon, who has been the photographing DNR activities, wildlife and outdoor recreation for nearly 25 years. The images are downloadable to be used as computer monitor "wallpaper" and feature a DNR watermark. Information also is available for media outlets interested in using DNR images.

"David Kenyon's work is well-known among the outdoor press, and we wanted to be able to show Michigan citizens and visitors the beauty and excitement he

captures in his daily work for the DNR," said Patricia Stewart, DNR chief communications officer. "We hope the public has the opportunity to visit the online gallery of his work, and appreciate the amazing natural resources and outdoor recreation experiences our state has to offer."

A link to the interactive map for the State Explorer program can be found on the "Learning Corner" area of the DNR Web site under information for the Explorer program. The map shows parks that offer the programs, and by clicking on the park a visitor can see a two-week schedule of State Explorer nature programs for children. The schedules also can be printed.

"This new feature will make it easy and convenient for families who are visiting our state parks to find nature programs geared toward teaching children about the outdoors," said Kevin Frailey, DNR education and outreach manager. "This will allow families to better plan their vacation or visit by knowing ahead of time what programs they might like to participate in at the park."

## WHAT YOU DO NOT KNOW CAN HURT YOU

She is a former state legislator and currently a regional director of the National Wild Turkey Federation's Women in the Outdoors program. She gave the following speech on Sept. 13 at the inaugural Sportsmen's Day at the Capital. Reprinted with permission from the Sept. 29 edition of Michigan Outdoor News.*

They say that what you don't know can't hurt you. But I'm here to tell you that what you don't know will hurt you!

Make no mistake; the Humane Society of the United States is the sportsman's principal enemy.

It is the nation's largest anti-hunting organization and this year may raise as much as \$130,000,000.

That's a \$130 million dollars folks!

Don't for one minute confuse the HSUS with your local dog and cat shelter. It probably has no affiliation. You're thinking of the American Humane Association, which was formed in the 19th century as a confederation of the locally based animal welfare shelters that sprung up after the Civil War.

The Humane Society of the U.S. is a Johnny-come-lately, by comparison. It was founded in 1954. It operates no animal shelters throughout the country. Rather, it mounts aggressive legislative and legal campaigns designed to revolutionize mankind's historic relationship with animals.

PETA? Most sportsmen mistakenly believe PETA is the main enemy, but here's the truth: PETA is a joke. It is in business to stage publicity stunts. Its ability to affect public policy is very slim.

My friends at the U.S. Sportsmen's Alliance, which for almost 30 years has been this nation's top defender of hunter's rights, tells me that none of its lobbyists have ever encountered a PETA representative working the anti-hunting issues in the Congress or state legislative bodies.

Not true for HSUS. It has been the main enemy of American hunters, anglers and trappers for many years. It spends its money in attempts to end hunting and the other elements of wildlife management in America. It is dangerous because it works hard and smart.

As of the end of 2005, it has dumped half a million dollars into the campaign to end dove hunting in our state. We don't know what it has spent so far in 2006 because it hasn't been required to file a finance report yet this year, but you can bet it's plenty.

And, HSUS is growing and becoming more sophisticated all the time. Two years ago, it convinced the infamous anti-hunting organization, The Fund for Animals to join with HSUS in a merger. The Fund for Animals was actually founded in the '60s by TV Guide critic Cleveland Amory, at the time an HSUS board member, because he was trying to provide competition to force HSUS to get involved more heavily in anti-hunting issues. The current president of HSUS, Wayne Pacelle, started his career with the Fund for Animals and realized the late Cleveland Amory's dream when he orchestrated the merger. If there was any doubt before that HSUS was serious about ending hunting, that doubt was put to rest by the merger. Almost the entire Fund for Animals top staff people are now in vice presidential posts with HSUS and each is a veteran of the anti-hunting wars.

To top it off, last week, HSUS announced another merger with the Doris Day Animal League. That merger provides HSUS with another 180,000 members and tens of millions of dollars in new income.

The real danger is that by consolidating the animal rights movement behind HSUS, the movement is growing more mainstream and acceptable to the public. Understand that the American public knows even less about the true motives of HSUS and groups like it than the average sportsman. This explains why they love to put our wildlife management issues on the ballot.

HSUS is working to distance itself from the radical fringe of the animal rights movement in outfits like Animal Liberation Front (ALF) and others that have preached violence in order to achieve their goals.

It's dangerous. It's growing and it is developing a newfound sophistication.

The question is: Are you ready for it?

Will you tell your family, friends, co-workers and fellow sportsmen and women what you know?

We must expose this campaign for what it really is in versus them. Hunters versus anti-hunters.

# OUTDOOR ENTHUSIASTS NEED TO SUPPORT PROPOSALS 1 & 3

This coming election day, Tuesday, November 7, sportsmen need to be aware of two proposals on the ballot that could have far ranging effects on outdoor sports in Michigan, Proposal 1 and Proposal 3. Proposal 1 is "a proposed constitutional amendment to require that money held in conservation and recreation funds can only be used for their intended purpose." This proposal will constitutionally guarantee that fees such as hunting and fishing license fees, boating and ORV registration fees, camping fees and others would only be spent for services related to the users that paid them and not be raided for any other purpose.

It's easy to see why many legislators are against this proposal but, to me, it's a no-brainer. Anyone who pays fees to enjoy their outdoor recreation should vote yes on Proposal 1 to guarantee the money they pay is used for the activities they love.

Proposal 3 would allow the establishment of a dove hunting season in Michigan as originally established through Public Act 160 of 2004. This proposal would: authorize a hunting season for mourning doves and require the DNR develop management strategies for the mourning dove season; create a \$2 mourning dove stamp hunters would be required to have along with their small game license; the money collected from the sale of the stamp would be evenly split between the Game and Fish Protection Fund and the Fish and Wildlife Trust Fund generating money to manage both game and non-game species.

But there's a lot more than re-establishing a mourning dove season going on here.

The referendum that brought this proposal to the voters was created and pushed by national anti-hunting and anti-fishing organizations. Organizations like the Humane Society of the United States (HSUS) and Fund for Animals want to see this proposal fail giving them a foothold in this state. The HSUS, the top financial supporter and driving force behind the referendum, whose financial support more than doubles that of all other supporters combined, is squarely against hunting and fishing and is working to end all hunting worldwide. One visit to their web site will show you what their true intentions are.

These organizations, along with PETA and others, tried similar tactics in 1996 when they pushed to end bear hunting in Michigan and failed.

The facts on the proposed mourning dove season are simple:

The United States recognizes and manages (through the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service) the mourning dove as a migratory game bird; 40 other states have established mourning dove seasons; Being migratory birds, the same doves that visit Michigan also travel through and winter in many of these states where they are hunted; Studies performed in states where hunting of doves is allowed show that hunting them has no negative impact on their population. In fact, some states have shown an increase in mourning dove numbers; Michigan is missing out on much needed revenue when Michigan hunters are forced to go to other states like Ohio and Indiana to hunt mourning doves.

Doves taste delicious, make great table fare and are enjoyed by millions annually.

Vote YES on Proposals 1 & 3 and support Michigan's outdoor heritage.






