



## JUNE FISHING REPORT

Limits Limits Limits!!! All I can say is this is the best fishing in this area in a long time.

### Erie

West sister island is producing limits of nice size walleye in the 3 to 6 pound range. Trolling spoons with mini divers are producing best. Brest Bay and the banana dike are also producing limits of eaters. Trolling hot-n-tots, spoons, drifting crawlers are all working.

### Detroit River

The jigging bite is still going strong but a lot of small mouth bass and silver bass are also being caught. The handlining bite trolling spoons during the day is going gang busters. Limits are coming very quickly. Best spots are by Peche island, the range lights, the whisky plant, Ren Cen, and the Belle Isle Bridge.

### Lake St Clair

The lake is taking off strong. Geno's to Metro Beach in 7 to 10 fow, trolling and drifting crawlers is producing fish in the mornings and evenings. The dumping grounds to the St Clair light are producing fish trolling harness with in-line weights. The Middle channel is producing limits drifting crawlers and jigging. The north channel by Grassy Island is producing fish at night and during the day.

### St Clair River

Whipping, handlining, jigging, drifting crawler harnesses are all producing limit catches.

## TROLLING THE BASICS

Trolling for walleye can seem like a major problem or the simplest thing in the world, depending on how you approach it. There are a few basic things that I do each and every time I go out. First off I am assuming you are properly equipped, that could be another topic.

**FIND THEM:** Use your sonar to locate what looks to you to be a school of walleye, so you need to be intimate with your equipment and know what a walleye looks like on your sonar. Looking for boat packs will sometimes work but you are then depending on someone else's skill and judgment.


**SET UP ON THEM:** Try and determine which way is best for you to troll. Generally this is with the waves or into them. Other times you may want to quarter the wave. You need to know your boat and how it handles in different wave conditions.

**BAIT SELECTION:** What baits have been working best, which have you caught walleye with in the past, start with your i go to baits and put out as many different baits as you have lines. Once you hopefully catch one or two make bait changes to the successful bait.

**SPEED CONTROL:** Understand a little about walleye and how they react to temperature, weather and water conditions. The colder the water the more lethargic the walleye will be so the slower you need to troll. The same goes for muddy water conditions. Warmer waters mean more active fish so your speed may need to be increased. General rule start around 2mph and adjust.

**RETURN TO HOT SPOT:** Once we catch a walleye we will go for about 5 minutes, if not having caught another we make a circle, figure eight or do a 180-degree turn and go over the same spot again. Walleye are schooling fish and generally where there is one there will be others.

**DON'T WASTE YOUR TIME:** After some period of time if you have not caught any walleye or are into all trash fish go back to 1 and start over.

# HELP PREVENT SPREAD OF AQUATIC INVASIVE SPECIES

As part of our ongoing effort to prevent the spread of aquatic invasive species, MUCC is offering a summer series of articles to help educate recreational boaters. Species such as the round goby, sea lamprey, zebra mussel, Eurasian water milfoil, and spiny water flea will be covered. The purpose of the articles is to help boaters identify invasive species, prevent their spread, and support legislative policies to protect Michigan's waters.

## ***What Are Aquatic Invasive Species?***

Aquatic invasive species (AIS) include non-native plants, animals and microscopic organisms that have caused problems in the nation's aquatic ecosystems. Invasive species are not native to our environment and they are defined as waterborne, non-native organisms that threaten the diversity or abundance of native species, the ecological stability of impacted waters, or threaten a commercial, agricultural, aquacultural, or recreational activity. Invasive species are also called alien, exotic, foreign, or introduced species.

## ***Why Are Invasive Species A Problem?***

Over the last century, the Great Lakes have coped with the biological invasion of over 170 non-native species causing serious, and possibly irreversible, damage to the health of the basin. Free from natural predators and competitors, non-native species reproduce rapidly in their new environment, overtake native species and become a costly nuisance. These "biological pollutants" have led to a severe loss of biodiversity, extinction, and habitat alteration throughout Michigan the have affected human health, reduced property values, and affected local economies of water-dependent communities.

There are hundreds of different harmful invasive species ranging from plants, fish, amphibians, crustaceans, mollusks, diseases and pathogens. The sea lamprey and zebra mussel are recognized among the most harmful as they have permanently altered the Great Lakes ecosystem. They prey upon and displace our native fish and wildlife, create a dangerous nuisance to boaters and anglers, damage valuable lakeshore infrastructure, and cost millions of dollars to control each year.

Invasive plants such as purple loosestrife and Eurasian watermilfoil are examples of aggressive plants that establish themselves quickly in wetlands and inland lakes and overtake native vegetation. They provide little food or habitat for native wildlife and form a dense growth that blocks access to the water or hinders activities such as boating or swimming.<sup>1</sup> In addition, they reduce game fish populations, ruin boat engines, and jam steering equipment.

## ***Where Do Invasive Species Come From?***

Since the opening of the St. Lawrence Seaway in 1959, ocean-going vessels have introduced 36 of the 50 new AIS in the Great Lakes Basin. The sea lamprey entered the Great Lakes in the 1920s following completion of the Welland Canal, which provided a route around Niagara Falls.

AIS are transported from international ports in the ballast tanks of vessels, where they are later released into Great Lakes waters. Acting as aquatic hitchhikers, AIS are spreading at alarming rates by hitching rides with anglers and boaters. Other introductions of AIS are the result of aquarium releases or escape from aquaculture facilities, and other invasive species travel to new locations on their own.

## ***What's the Cost?***

Invasive species are a growing and potentially devastating threat to the economy and natural resources of the Great Lakes. Invasive species have cost citizens and businesses upwards of \$10 billion over the past decade.<sup>2</sup>

These invaders dramatically increase the operating costs of drinking water plants, power plants, dam maintenance, and industrial processes. One report estimates the Great Lakes spend \$12 million a year to control sea lamprey and \$30 million to control zebra mussels. Individual power companies have testified that it costs each of them upwards of \$1 million per year to deal with the zebra mussels on their intake pipes. The estimated cost to the Great Lakes fishery from introduction of the ruffe is upwards of \$119 million per year. These impacts show the direct connection between the health of our waters and the health of our economy.

## ***What Should Be Done?***

The large-scale threats posed by invasive species must be addressed to Michigan by implementation of the following:

- \* Prevention
- \* Early detection and rapid response
- \* Control and management
- \* Adequate funding
- \* Public outreach and education
- \* Research and monitoring

## ***A Need for Action***

The Great Lakes Ecology Protection Act of 2003 calls for best management practices for ballast water treatment to remove invasive species before exchange. In 2002, Michigan joined New York, Minnesota and Illinois in filing a brief urging the EPA to regulate ballast water discharges through the Clean Water Act. The EPA rejected the request in September 2003.<sup>4</sup> At the request of Governor Jennifer Granholm, the Michigan attorney general has pursued legal avenues that require the EPA to regulate ballast water from ships in the Great Lakes to help control AIS.

## **MUCC Recommendations**

\*Ballast water standards must be established immediately. The establishment of aggressive, yet achievable, interim ballast water standards will encourage further technological development and the creation of biologically effective final ballast water standards. The lack of standards is a significant impediment to developing badly needed ballast water treatment technologies.

\*Support the National Aquatic Invasive Species Act 6 (NAISA, S. 525, and H.R. 1080/H.R. 1081) which offers the most comprehensive legislation to date to deal with the problem of invasive species in the United States. The bills seek to improve and reauthorize the original NAISA of 1990.

\*Focus further research of the two primary entry modes of aquatic invasive species into the Great Lakes; the St. Lawrence Seaway and the Chicago Sanitary and Ship Canal. Focusing on these two entry points could effectively control a large percentage of potential new invasive species. Stemming the flow of new aquatic invaders must be done before any remediation of current invaders can begin.

\*Continue to support efforts by national and state managers in the fight against aquatic invasive species such as the sea lamprey. Through continued pressure and scientific management, the number of sea lamprey in our waterways has been dramatically reduced. However, if efforts were to stop or be scaled back researchers believe that the lamprey would come back in ever increasing numbers.

With warm, spring weather moving in, the Department of Natural Resources officials are encouraging campers to make reservations now for summer camping plans.




Thirty-five state parks and recreation areas will have the same nightly rates as in 2005. Budget-conscious campers should put these locations at the top of their list for possible camping options:
